Regulatory Update:

Clean Water Act:

- Expansion of the definition of navigable waters apply to all waters within the U.S.
- Public meetings in Washington, DC December 16-18
- Sen. Giessel Interstate Mining Compact Commission huge issue for them, massive expansion that EPSC needs to be aware of

President's Climate Initiative:

- Continued expansion of EPA authority to regulate greenhouse gas emissions impacts everyone in the LLS
- Carbon emissions from new power plants significant impact also on existing coal fueled power plants
- Rep. Lockhart hearings in non-coal producing states, there's a meeting in Colorado with demonstrations how to fight fire with fire, opportunity for reduced employment
- Rep. Kasperick meeting is today, many buses are heading to Colorado to participate

Sage Grouse:

- Potential Endangered Species Act listing high impact in Western States
- Speaker Lubnau Spoke about Sage Grouse with the Speakers from Idaho, Utah & Montana who are all on board, Nevada's wasn't up on the issue and Oregon's wasn't too interested; What we've learned from wolves regulating distinct population that doesn't focus on state boundaries a unified plan amongst the states is very important; there exists some tension between the Executive and Legislative branches, Idaho and Wyoming have "Cadillac Plans"
- Rep. Handy Are there any hard deadlines as to when delisting might be considered?
 - States are working on plans, but not aware if there are any hard deadlines
- BLM <u>released a proposed plan</u> to protect greater sage grouse in three states Utah, Idaho and Nevada, which would prohibit drilling, grazing, recreation activities and a variety of other activities within 4 miles of leks, the places where the bird stages it late-winter mating ritual. Plan is part of the National Greater Sage-Grouse Planning Strategy. Environmental organizations have also asked DOI to exercise its authority over subsurface mineral rights in eastern Wyoming and forbid new well pads and associated infrastructure inside state-designated core sage grouse area until it has finalized resource plan amendments designed to protect grouse in the region.
 ACTION ITEM: Need to develop list of opportunities to comment

BLM Permitting:

- There have been complications to both leasing and permitting for activities on BLM land
- Delays in permitting continues, which leads developers to consider public lands less attractive and to allocate their resources elsewhere

Sequestration:

- Awaiting to see when DOI will return funds "expeditiously" Wyoming received their funds on Oct. 30, with the notification that federal mineral revenues in the amount of 8% for FY 2014 would be withheld until FY 2015
- Working on legislative efforts to eliminate the possibility of this happening again in the future
- Rep. Barrus believe collaborative effort, with so much emphasis placed on it federal government had to work on it
- Sen. Giessel signifies core reason for forming EPSC, threats to state sovereignty, EPSC responded to threat successfully
- Speaker Lubnau EPSC has started to see some success, acting alone no one listens but when correspondence from legislators representing 15 states, they paid attention. Cooperative approach in interest of all states have been pretty productive

Priority Issues:

Endangered Species Act (ESA):

Sen. Giessel

- Massive topic, 40th anniversary of ESA, need to preserve the environment but utilize the resources there
- Took nearly 19 years to get 1 species de-listed, Stellar Sea Lion
- Participation of states where appropriate is very important
- Fish & Wildlife using 100 year model projections as basis for their Bearded Seal listing
- Use both "science and art" in their projections
- Alaska is pushing back
- States play an important role need to make sure that states require collaboration as required within Section 6 of ESA
- Can other states create maps to explain the overreach? Alaska field numerous lawsuits, rarely
 effective
- Rep. Barrus each state is impacted, activists use ESA to control energy policy; need to identify
 other organizations working on this issue and collaborate how to best utilize support. Ex.
 Interstate Mining Compact Commission
- Rep. Handy group like, "Big Game Forever" hunters are best conservationists
- Jack Belcher IPAA puts out a weekly report on ESA
- Rep. Koch not as big an issue in Indiana as other states, does impact us and will work with you as well
- Rep. Diaz nothing that stands out for Florida

ACTION ITEM: Find and Collaborate with other groups, reach out and pull plan together

Ocean Policy:

Jack Belcher, for Rep. Charisse Millett who was ill and unable to participate

- National Ocean Policy established by Executive Order overseas 27 different agencies;
 Coastal and Marine Spatial Planning 9 regional planning bodies across the country
- Impact economic and recreational efforts and activities
- Lot of activity at both the state and federal level
- Sen. Giessel huge implications for Alaska curtail harvest of significant food source; not going through the regulatory process; Governors met recently what do they have to say?
- Sen. Perkins seeing a parallel with Clean Water Act impact land locked states like
 Wyoming, wetlands as applied to irrigation effect land lovers just as much as coastal
 residents; have to extend Federal Mineral Revenues model get Governor's involved need
 to coordinate with them to ensure Congressional delegations understand the potential
 impact
- Rep. Barrus find way to coordinate activities within our states

ACTION ITEMS: Legislators and Governors weigh in on Regional Planning Bodies; Outreach to other organizations to collaborate

EPSC is adding its name to letter from National Ocean Policy Coalition over ocean zoning

Access, Land Exchange:

Rep. Handy

- Federal government cannot manage its own lands
- Federal government shutdown \$30 million cost to the state of Utah
 - Utah held a special session to appropriate money for parks
 - States can manage resources much more effectively
- States fighting battle alone as individual states won't work
- Sen. Bebout in Wyoming, there is a Select Committee that is co-chaired by EPSC members, Sen. Bebout and Rep. Stubson, schedule meetings across the state, BLM office RMP commenting on these, active in writing letters and taking testimony, legislatively driven and has a budget and staff support, now in statute deal with issue every year, can bring legislation to the floor
- Rep. Stubson good summary, has had an impact changes on RMP's, good cooperation with federal agencies, other than EPA, which has refused to participate
- Sen. Giessel Advisory Council on Federal Lands, like Eli's suggestion of legislation
- Rep. Barrus Utah <u>HB 142</u> does a lot of what Sen. Bebout is doing in Wyoming, economic and management analysis includes a comparison of how state lands are managed; Rep. Rob Bishop (R, UT 1) has his Public Lands Initiative to prevent another public monument within the state
- Sen. Bebout Rep. Ken Ivory (UT) is very active in Utah Public Lands Task Force. Can we engage our eastern state colleagues to help get the movement moving forward?

ACTION ITEMS: Share the best practices from Wyoming and Utah, add information to website and newsletter; further engage sister states in public lands

Settlement Agreements:

Rep. Barrus

- Also "Sue and Settle"
- US Chamber's report, "Sue and Settle: Regulating Behind Closed Doors"
- 60 instances where EPA has refused to fight litigation and settled between 2009-2012 – settlement was favored action of the plaintiff
- In 2011, Sen. Barrasso and Sen. Hatch, "Government Litigation Savings Act" introduced to reform the process, Rep. Lummis has introduced House version, HR 3037 "Government Litigation Savings Act," which has been assigned to the House Judiciary Committee. Bill intended to prevent abuse of the Equal Access to Justice Act by environmental groups and others who frequently challenge the federal government in court.
- Rep. Lockhart this issue has gotten way out of control expanding exponentially, we need to change this bad practice
- Sen. Perkins Should we send letters/comments to Rep. Lummis?
- Rep. Handy EPSC should draft a template letter which can be sent from both EPSC and individual legislators

ACTION ITEMS: EPSC needs to weigh in on HR 3037; find collaborative groups to require the federal government to defend themselves against activist lawsuits
